



## Beyond the Blueprint

Award-winning architect Daniel Joseph Chenin is beautifying Nevada one project at a time. *by* ALLISON MITCHELL

"Design should be more than a visual exercise; it should be a deeply experiential journey. Whether in architecture, interiors or the objects we surround ourselves with, I believe in curating pieces with a story," says award-winning architect Daniel Joseph Chenin (djc-ltd.com), the eponymous principal behind the Las Vegas firm that specializes in luxury residential architecture and interiors. A member of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) College of Fellows—an honor bestowed upon less than 3% of architects—and an AIA Nevada Firm of the Year Award recipient, Chenin has distinguished himself and his firm as a leader far beyond Nevada's state lines.

His passion began in his youth, with his grandmother playing an integral role. "My fascination with architecture began in childhood, sparked by countless hours building with LEGOs and art lessons taught by my grandmother, who instilled in me an appreciation for composition, color and craftsmanship," he recalls. "Those early experiences shaped the way I saw the world, understanding how form, structure and creativity come together to make something greater than the sum of its parts."

From there, he earned his master's degree in architecture from UNLV and spent 10 years working for a globally acclaimed interior design firm. In 2014, he ventured out on his own. "I sought to create a practice that seamlessly integrated architecture, interiors and craftsmanship, where every space is an experience designed to engage all the senses and evoke a strong sense of place," he shares.

As he expands his work into new projects that explore material innovation, craftsmanship and multi-sensory design, Chenin is also focused on paying it forward. "I'm passionate about mentorship and supporting emerging architects, ensuring that the next generation continues to refine and evolve the craft of architecture," says Chenin.
